Dr Becky Alexis-Martin is an award-winning lecturer, photographer and author. She researches the social, economic and environmental implications of global challenges from climate change to warfare.



Lessons in sustainability: An explorer's tale / [Jason Lewis](#)



Discover what can be attacked by a crocodile, spending a year alone at sea, contracting blood poisoning and malaria, being held for espionage, and getting hit by a car and left for dead teach us about global sustainability?

Jason Lewis is an award-winning explorer, author, and environmental champion. He is credited by Guinness World Records as the first person to circumnavigate the Earth without using motors or sails.



Changing places: communities, relationships and participation / [Sally Lloyd-Evans](#)



Drawing on recent UK examples, Sally explores how local communities experience and understand place in an era of economic uncertainty. Focusing on social inequality and diversity, she examines the importance of connections between people and organisations in shaping life chances.

Dr Sally Lloyd-Evans is an Associate Professor in Human Geography at the University of Reading. Sally researches globalisation, labour markets and livelihoods from gender and social justice perspectives.



Landscape Systems in the Anthropocene / [Martin Evans](#)



Martin will explore the degree to which the impact of people has become the dominant force shaping the landforms and sediment fluxes which make up contemporary landscape systems.

Martin has 20 years' experience working on upland peatlands researching the impact of erosion and restoration on water, carbon and pollutant flux, with a focus on peatland carbon balance.



Daily experiences of water insecurities across geographies / [Sonia Hoque](#)



Sonia will explain the environmental, social and institutional risks to water security of poor populations, the daily challenges of accessing safe and affordable drinking water in semi-arid rural Kenya, and the impacts of industrial water pollution in Dhaka, Bangladesh.

Sonia Hoque is an environmental social scientist at the University of Oxford. Her research focuses on people's water use behaviour and choices in water-stressed regions.
