Religious tolerance, faith and society / [Sayeeda Warsi](#)




Baroness Warsi will explore the role of faith and religion in society today. She will consider the threats associated with secularisation and the importance of viewing faith as a positive power in our society.

Identity and socialisation – who we are and who we can be / [Dexter Dias QC](#)



Danny Dorling is Halford Mackinder Professor of Geography at Oxford University, he has co-authored dozens of books and journals on social inequalities. His work concerns housing, health, employment, education and poverty.
